# Wake Up, America!



He talked about the changes he wants to make in No Child Left Behind, which he wants to make "inspirational," rather than the "toxic" reputation the federal act has now. I'm grateful that he's gathering views from people

But what I want to hear is that we are going to look a little deeper for the school solution, right down to our philosophical roots. And here's the question we need to ask ourselves:

## Are kids products or are they people?

People, of course, we want to say, but wait! Let's take a closer look at the way we deal with kids in schools: Our current "factory" concept is more attuned to "manufacturing" kids with factoids, skills, labels, statistics--and our current love affair with "standardized testing" is surely the arch-example of my point. So, while we're reimagining NCLB, Mr. Secretary, let's also bring our school structure into congruence with our deepest beliefs!

In an age when the Information Revolution has pulled us from our industrial moorings into a flood of ideas, opinions, arguments, and in-your-face marketing; in an age when the Green Revolution is creating a new economy of entrepreneurs waiting to grow up through the rubble of the old; in an age when the Global Revolution is shrinking the world every moment and transforming our concept of "nation"--we MUST have more to offer our kids than an outdated, traditional, and bureaucratic school system that is prey to petty politics, self-serving agendas, numbers and quotas, and monumental absurdity.

Enough fingerpointing and blaming! Sure, good teachers inspire kids to learn. Sure, smaller, more personalized environments allow the kind of collaboration and attention that help kids learn. Sure, kids need to feel a sense of belonging in their schools. We know all that. The only question that remains is how can we extrapolate those

### Radical Reinvention, Please

In the Interview with the Author that follows the story in the new 2009 edition of *Angel Park*, I have a chance to answer the big question on everybody's mind: How do I think my novel can have an effect on an issue as big as school reform? This is what I said there, and this is what I believe and will continue to discuss, speak about, write about, and gather support for as we move through this year of monumental personal, institutional, and societal changes:

"My novel Angel Park can help with the most important first step, which is opening readers' eyes to a new way of thinking and providing a new perspective not only on school systems but also on how we live our lives. This IS a big issue, and one of the most important ones we will face this century: How can we create schools that will train our students to be productive and happy contributors to our way of life and to the world? Isn't that really the main question?"

After twenty-five years in the public school trenches, fighting for change in all aspects of education—I am finally beginning to figure out and, more importantly, say out loud that the people running the system are not going to be the ones who change it. Having been there and done that many times myself, watching the system snap back into place like an overstretched rubber band the minute my back was turned, I can tell you that we are going to have to offer new ideas, raise the level of dialogue, spread word of the new dialogue, and bring together the best examples of progress in public education to get the attention of the public and then the attention of policymakers.

We need radical reform in the way schools treat kids.

A little cosmetic tweaking or more studies or more pilot programs will just not get it. We've had 40 years of that kind of piecemeal change, and our schools are in a deeper hole than ever, wouldn't you agree?

Raising test scores and throwing more money at the problem are just more futile attempts to disguise the underlying issues, which are huge and societal in their import. That's the kind of perspective that *Angel Park* will help you see. I wrote a fictional expose, an insider's view of what is really going on in schools, to help readers all over the country feel the emotional drag that keeps kids, teachers, and parents fighting a battle every year, just to keep kids in school and their heads above water. I hope my story provides America's wake-up call to the vast industrial complex we have created around a system that needs

concepts to the reinvention of our entire system of public education?
